





Dental emergencies have a way of arriving at the worst possible moment. A cracked molar at dinner. A child waking up at 2 a.m. With facial swelling. A sudden jolt of pain that turns an ordinary workday into a scramble for help. When that happens, people do not want to compare websites, guess at office quality, or wonder whether they will be seen in time.
