Step-by-Step Troubleshooting Guide

If you are experiencing recurring crashes, overcome the following troubleshooting steps methodically.

1. Verify the Integrity of Game Files

Gradually, video game files can become corrupted due to unforeseen system shutdowns, incomplete updates, or faulty storage drives. Steam has a built-in tool to examine and replace missing out on or broken files.

- Open the **Steam Library**.
- Right-click on **CS: GO** and choose **Properties**.
- Navigate to the **Local Files** tab.
- Click **Verify Integrity of Game Files**.
- Wait for the procedure to finish (Steam will automatically download any damaged files), then reboot your computer system.

2. Update or Roll Back Graphics Drivers

- **NVIDIA Users:** Open GeForce Experience or go to the main NVIDIA website to download the current Game Ready Driver.

- *Pro Tip:* If the crashes began immediately after a driver update, use a tool like **Display Driver Uninstaller (DDU)** in Safe Mode to entirely wipe the old driver before setting up a stable, older variation.

3. Change Launch Options

Particular launch options can cs2skin.com force CS: GO to run in a more steady environment, bypassing introduction videos or forcing particular DirectX modes.

- Go to your Steam Library, right-click **CS: GO**, and select **Properties**.
- Under the **General** tab, look for **Launch Options**.
- Go into the following advised steady commands (separated by areas):
 - -novid (Skips the introduction video, reducing load-time crashes)
 - -high (Sets CS: GO to high CPU top priority)
 - -autoconfig (Resets video and efficiency settings to default if the game refuses to launch)

4. Run the Game as Administrator

Permissions issues can often prevent CS: GO from accessing essential system files or conserving setup modifications.

- Navigate to your CS: GO installation folder (typically C: \ Program Files (x86)\ Steam \ steamapps \ typical \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive).
- Locate the primary executable file (csgo.exe).
- Right-click the file and select **Properties**.
- Go to the **Compatibility** tab and check **Run this program as an administrator**.
- Click Apply and OK.

5. Check for Background Application Interference

Overlay software application and hardware monitoring tools often hook into the DirectX pipeline of video games, which can cause unexpected crashes. Try disabling the following applications while playing:

- Discord Overlay
- NVIDIA GeForce Experience Overlay
- RivaTuner Statistics Server (RTSS) and MSI Afterburner
- Third-party anti-viruses software (attempt including an exclusion for the Steam folder)

Advanced Troubleshooting

If standard repairs stop working to deal with the problem, the problem may lie much deeper within your os or hardware configuration.

1. Handling Overclocks and XMP Profiles

While overclocking your CPU, GPU, or RAM supplies an efficiency boost, CS: GO is infamously delicate to hardware instability.

- If you have used an aggressive overclock, attempt dialing it back to standard factory specifications.
- If you are running high-speed RAM, test disabling your motherboard's **XMP (Extreme Memory Profile)** or **DOCP** in the BIOS to see if memory instability is triggering the crashes.

2. Reinstalling CS: GO Cleanly

In some cases, remaining custom maps, out-of-date workshop products, or heavily customized configuration files cause consistent conflicts.



- Uninstall CS: GO through Steam.
- By hand browse to the installation directory site (... steamapps \ common \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive) and erase any staying folders.
- Reinstall a fresh copy of the game.

Preventative Maintenance Checklist

- **Keep Windows Updated:** Install the latest cumulative updates for your operating system.
