3. Coinflip

A straightforward 1v1 game mode. 2 gamers wager skins of approximately equal worth. The system appoints one player "Terrorist" and the other "Counter-Terrorist," flips a virtual coin, and the winner takes the whole pot (minus a small site commission, understood as the rake).

4. Jackpot

Numerous players toss skins into a common pot. The worth of each gamer's skins identifies their percentage opportunity of winning the entire swimming pool. A virtual spinner chooses the winner, implying a gamer who transferred a low-value skin still has a possibility-- albeit a small one-- to win whatever.
