## **Does knowing your main valve location really reduce emergency plumber costs?**

Open any faucets downstream of the shutoff to release remaining water pressure in the pipes—this prevents secondary leaks and gives your plumber a safer environment to diagnose the actual break point.

Next, identify which fixtures are affected. Is water spraying from a single sink, or has a pipe burst inside your wall? Are you seeing water pooling on the floor, or is it dripping steadily? If water is still running when your emergency plumber arrives, they must first locate and stop it themselves—adding 15 to 30 minutes of labor to the bill.
