Step-by-Step Guides for Common DIY Door Repairs

1. Repairing a Squeaky or Loose Hinge

A squeaky door is an easy fix, but a loose hinge needs a bit more attention.

1. **Locate the issue:** Open and close the door gradually to determine the problematic hinge.
2. **Tighten up screws:** Use a screwdriver to tighten up any loose screws. If the screw holes have actually ended up being stripped, get rid of the screws, insert a small wood sliver (or a toothpick covered in wood glue) into the hole, and reinsert the screw for a tight grip.
3. **Oil:** If the door squeaks, use a few drops of lightweight maker oil, silicone spray, or petroleum jelly to the hinge pin. Wipe away any excess.

2. Adjusting a Sticking Door

If a door rubs against the frame when closing, it is normally because the leading hinge is loose, triggering the door to sag, or the wood has actually expanded.

1. **Inspect the hinges:** Tighten all screws on the leading and middle hinges.
2. **Use the longer screw technique:** If tightening up does not work, change one brief screw on the frame side of the leading hinge with a 3-inch wood screw. Drive it deep into the framing stud to pull the entire door assembly back into positioning.

3. **Aircraft the edge:** If the door still sticks after changing the hinges, use a block airplane or a sander to shave down a small fraction of wood from the sticking edge, then repaint or seal the exposed wood.

Preventive Maintenance Tips

To extend the lifespan of your doors and reduce the need for unexpected repairs, follow these easy preventive maintenance steps twice a year:

- **Check Weatherstripping:** Inspect exterior doors yearly for fractures, tears, or compression. Replace used strips to maintain home energy effectiveness.
- **Keep Tracks Clean:** For sliding glass doors and pocket doors, vacuum out dust, hair, and debris from the tracks frequently. Lubricate tracks with a silicone-based spray (prevent sticky lubricants like grease, which attract dirt).
- **Inspect Hardware:** Periodically inspect doorknobs, deals with, strikes plates, and deadbolts to guarantee they are secure and operating smoothly.
- **Control Indoor Humidity:** Since wood expands and contracts with wetness, keeping a steady indoor humidity level using cooling or dehumidifiers helps prevent wooden doors from deforming and sticking.
