



Seasonal pests rarely arrive by accident. They follow food, moisture, shelter, and temperature shifts with impressive consistency. Summer turns minor pest issues into persistent ones

Warm weather creates ideal breeding and feeding conditions. In summer, a home can support far more pest activity than it can in winter, and people inadvertently help by grilling, gardening, watering, and moving in and out through open doors.

Ants remain active, but summer also brings stronger pressure from wasps, yellow jackets, mosquitoes, flies, and occasional invaders drawn by heat and moisture.
