1. Keep and use them in-game.
2. Sell them on the Steam Community Market for Steam Wallet funds.
3. Trade them directly with other gamers through Steam trades.
4. Gamble or offer them on third-party market websites (though players must always work out care with external sites).

Popular Skin Themes

For many years, particular skin collections have actually dominated the neighborhood's preferences. Gamers frequently purchase matching sets to offer their base and equipment a merged appearance. Some of the most popular themes include:

- **Glowing (Glow-in-the-Dark):** Highly demanded because they enable gamers to see their weapons and hotbars in dark environments or during the Rust night cycle.

- **Arrange Your Gear Sets:** Keep a dedicated package for roaming, raiding, and farming so you don't unintentionally wander with your most expensive collector's items unless you are prepared to lose them.
