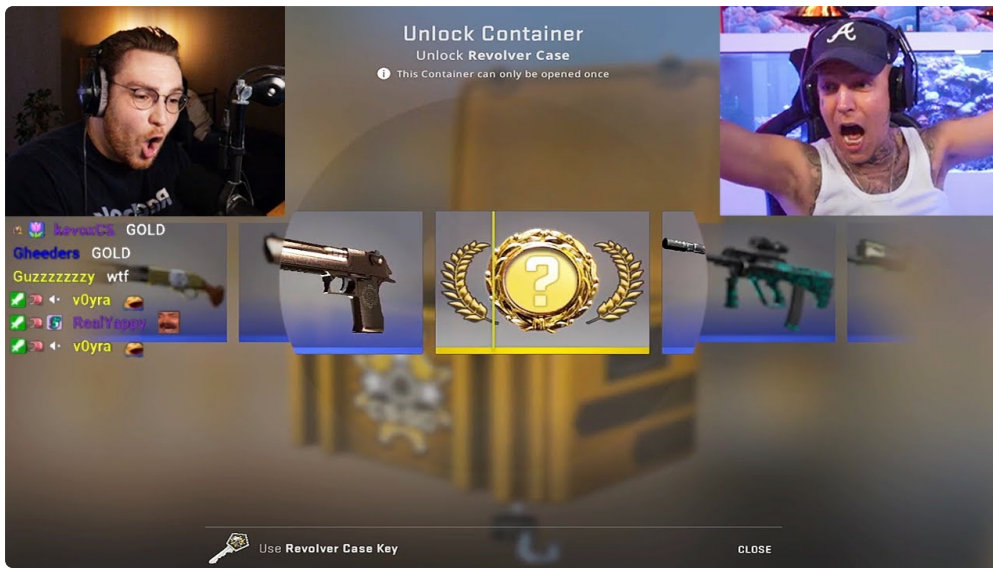


The Ultimate Guide to CS2 Case Battles: Mechanics, Strategies, and Safety

- **Check Trade Restrictions:** Remember that freshly withdrawn skins usually bring a 7-day trade lock imposed by Valve before they can be moved or traded once again.
