- **Trade Lock Implementations:** To combat instant skin trading on gambling sites, Valve introduced a **7-day trade hold**. If a gamer receives a skin in a trade, they can not trade it once again for a full week. This severely disrupted the automated, high-frequency trading bots used by CSGO casinos.
- **Account Bans:** Valve routinely bans accounts associated with business gambling, resulting in countless dollars worth of skins being locked permanently inside banned inventories.
