Low-to-Moderate (50/50 chances minus platform rake) **Jackpot/ Pot** Numerous gamers deposit skins into a communal swimming pool. Each skin includes to the player's "ticket" share. A random ticket is drawn, and the winner takes the whole pot. High (Depends on the portion of the pot owned) **Case Opening** Replicates the official Valve case openings, often with higher or tailored chances and distinct prize swimming pools. High (Typically unfavorable go back to player ratios) **Esports Betting** Betting skins or cash on expert CS: GO/CS2 matches (e.g., ESL Pro League, Majors) based on live chances. Skill/Knowledge-dependent (Moderate threat)
