Airports use this system to prevent people from using short stay drop-off zones or pay-on-exit car parks for free or very cheap parking by leaving and returning frequently.

For example, if you drop off a passenger and then come back within an hour or two, the car park ticketing system will register your vehicle's exit and re-entry, and you may have to pay an additional fee.

How Re-Entry Charges Work in Practice

1. You enter an airport car park and take a ticket or get your license plate recorded.
2. You park for a short time, perhaps to drop off or collect passengers.
3. You exit the car park but then return within a stipulated time period (often less than an hour, though this varies).
4. The system treats this as a new parking session and charges an extra fee—either a flat re-entry fee or a full drop-off charge.

It's crucial to check the **car park small print** before you assume you can leave and come back within an hour without penalty.



Average UK Airport Drop-Off Charges and Rising Fees

Airport car parks are increasingly using automated barriers and ANPR (automatic number plate recognition) technology to enforce re-entry rules. The terms and conditions, often found in the small print, will explain the exact time limits and whether re-entry fees apply.

Common clauses to watch for:

- **Free exit and re-entry window:** Some car parks allow you to leave and return within 15-60 minutes free of charge.
- **Maximum free parking time:** Short stay zones might be free for only 10-30 minutes during drop-off.
- **Penalty fees for re-entry:** After the free window closes, a flat fee or full short stay charge applies.
- **Valid ticket presentation:** You must keep your ticket and use it on re-entry to avoid fines.

Be vigilant: These rules vary widely from airport to airport, so it's always advisable to check official airport websites or trusted comparison tools before your trip.

Free Alternatives: Long Stay and Park & Ride Options
