In regions where winter temps regularly dip below 0°F or beyond, investing in systems rated for at least -20°F can reduce your heating bills and improve comfort. Although MRCOOL's DIY convenience is attractive, its lower rated heating range is a valid concern in harsh climates.

2. **Match Zones to Physical Layout:** 2-zone systems usually split living and sleeping areas. 3-zone kits add more flexibility (e.g., basement or bonus room).
3. **Consider Refrigerant Line Set Length:** Longer line sets can increase installation cost (especially pro jobs) and may require upsizing the unit.
