Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Substantial wear, fading colors, and heavy scratching.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Very used, often altering the graphic completely. <i>(Note: Some skins look uniquely cool in BS, referred to as "Blackscars").</i>

StatTrak™ and Souvenirs

- **StatTrak™:** Items with this technology feature an orange LED counter that tracks the variety of verified kills made with that particular weapon.
- **Keepsake Packages:** These are dropped during main Valve-sponsored esports tournaments (Majors) and feature gold stickers representing the teams and MVP of the round.

The Rarity Tiers

Valve organizes CS2 skins into standardized rarity tiers, which dictate how regularly they drop in-game or emerge from weapon cases.

1. **Customer Grade (White):** Common, basic drops.

2. **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly much better than Consumer, typical in containers.
3. **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** Standard lower-tier case drops.
4. **Restricted (Purple):** Often forms the base ingredients for trade-ups.
5. **Classified (Pink):** Highly detailed, desirable mid-tier skins.
6. **Covert (Red):** The highest standard rarity found in cases, including the most intricate designs.
7. **Exotic/ Special (Gold):** Knives and Gloves-- the crown gems of any CS2 inventory.
