Residential, commercial, and automotive work under one roof

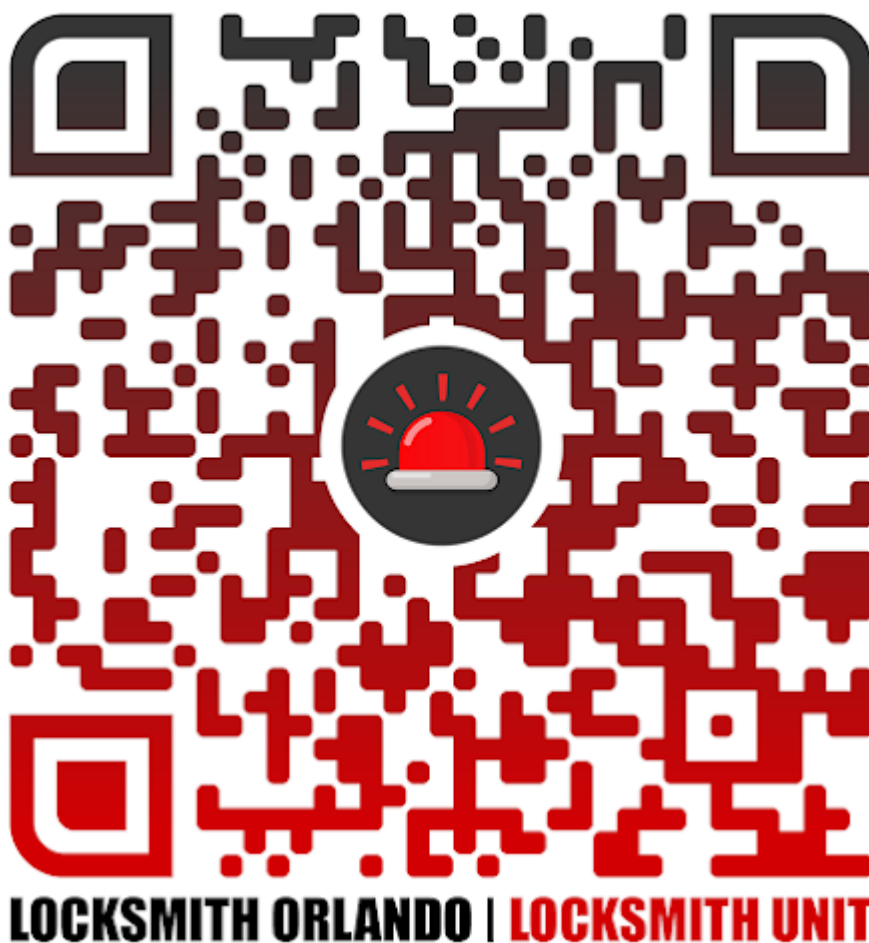
