A virtual coin flip decides the winner of the entire pot. 50/50 chances (minus website rake). **Prize** Several gamers contribute skins to a main pot. The more a gamer contributes, the higher their visual portion opportunity of winning the whole pot. Probability-based; larger factors have much better odds but risk more.

How Transactions Work: Deposits and Withdrawals
