Step-by-Step Guides for Common DIY Window Fixes

1. Replacing Worn Weatherstripping

Drafty windows are frequently the outcome of flattened or missing out on weatherstripping.

- **Step 1:** Clean the window channel thoroughly to get rid of dirt and old adhesive.
- **Step 2:** Measure the boundary of the window sash.
- **Step 3:** Cut the brand-new weatherstripping (V-strip, foam tape, or felt) to size.

2. Fixing a Stuck Window

3. Changing a Cracked Single-Pane Window

If a single pane of glass breaks, it can be replaced without purchasing an entire new window unit.

- **Step 1:** Put on durable work gloves and safety glasses. Thoroughly eliminate all broken glass fragments from the frame.
- **Step 2:** Scrape away the old glazing putty and get rid of the metal sparkles holding the glass in place.
- **Action 3:** Measure the opening and cut a new piece of glass (or have a hardware shop cut it) somewhat smaller than the opening.
- **Step 4:** Apply a fresh bed of glazing putty to the rabbet (the recess where the glass sits).
- **Step 5:** Press the glass firmly into the putty, secure it with brand-new glazing points, and use a bevel of putty around the outside edge. Paint when dry.

Preventive Maintenance: How to Make Your Windows Last

The very best window repair is the one you never ever need to make. Routine upkeep can dramatically extend the life expectancy of windows:

- **Clean Regularly:** Wipe down tracks, frames, and glass at least twice a year to avoid dirt accumulation that causes jams.

- **Oil Moving Parts:** Apply a light lubricant to hinges, locks, and moving tracks once a year.
- **Control Indoor Humidity:** Use dehumidifiers in wet locations like basements to prevent condensation and subsequent wood rot.

- **Vinyl windows:** 20 to 40 years.
- **Wood windows:** 30 to 50+ years (with appropriate maintenance).
- **Aluminum windows:** 20 to 25 years.
