1. The Sticking Door

- **Action 1:** Inspect the hinges. Tighten any loose screws. If the screw holes are stripped, remove the screws, insert wood glue and toothpicks into the holes, let dry, and re-insert the screws.
- **Action 2:** If the door still sticks, find the binding point by sliding a piece of paper along the space.
- **Step 3:** Sand or aircraft the high spot down. Re-seal or paint the exposed wood to avoid moisture absorption.

2. Squeaky Hinges

A squeaking hinge is an easy fix that yields pleasure principle.

- **Step 1:** Open the door and location a wedge below it for stability.
- **Step 2:** Tap the hinge pin up utilizing a hammer and a nail or punch tool.
- **Step 3:** Clean the pin with a wire brush or rag, apply a lubricant (such as white lithium grease, petroleum jelly, or silicone spray-- avoid cooking oils that draw in dust), and tap the pin back into place.

3. A Loose or Misaligned Latch

When a door fails to remain shut, the latch bolt is most likely missing out on the strike plate.

- **Action 1:** Apply lipstick to the latch bolt and close the door. The lipstick will leave a mark on the door frame, showing where the latch is hitting.
- **Action 2:** Adjust the strike plate by loosening it and filing down the hole, or moving it a little up or to line up with the mark.

Common Window Issues and How to Fix Them

Windows are vital for ventilation and natural light, however they are likewise primary culprits for energy loss.

1. Drafty Windows

Drafts indicate abject weatherstripping or failed caulking around the window frame.

- **Action 1:** Inspect the outside border of the window. If the old caulk is broken or missing, scrape it away, clean the area, and apply a fresh bead of exterior-grade silicone caulk.
- **Action 2:** For double-hung windows, replace worn-out V-strip or foam weatherstripping along the sashes to create a tight seal when closed.

2. Stuck Single or Double-Hung Windows

Paint accumulation or dirt tracks can glue a window shut.

- **Step 1:** Run an utility knife carefully around the border of the sash to break any seals formed by dried paint.
- **Step 2:** Tap gently along the frame with a rubber mallet to loosen up the wood or vinyl.
- **Step 3:** Clean the tracks thoroughly and apply a silicone-based lube to assist the window slide efficiently.

3. Foggy Double-Pane Glass

If condensation appears *in between* the 2 panes of a double-pane (insulated glass) window, the seal has stopped working. Regrettably, this generally requires changing the glass system (IGU) rather than the entire window frame.

Debris, pet hair, and dirt frequently collect in the bottom track, triggering the door to jam. Vacuum the track thoroughly, wash it with warm soapy water, and use a silicone lubricant. If the door still struggles, the rollers underneath the door might require adjustment or replacement.
