

Port Jefferson Station is the kind of place that reveals itself slowly. On a map, it can look like a simple Suffolk County hamlet tucked inland from the ferry traffic and harbor bustle of Port Jefferson Village. Spend time there, though, and the place starts to feel layered. You notice the old rail corridor, the working neighborhoods, the modest commercial strips, the tree-lined residential streets, and the quiet pride people take in keeping their homes and properties in good shape.
