Usually the most pricey. **Very Little Wear (MW)** 0.07-- 0.15 Very light wear, frequently just obvious upon close inspection. **Field-Tested (FT)** 0.15-- 0.38 Noticeable scratches and endure popular edges, but the artwork stays largely undamaged. **Well-Worn (WW)** 0.38-- 0.45 Considerable wear, heavy scratching, and visible fading of colors. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.45-- 1.00 Incredibly used, rusted, or heavily faded. Often demanded for special "black-grind" impacts.

The Economy: Cases, Markets, and Trading

The CS: GO skin economy runs just like a real-world stock market. Rates vary based upon supply and need, esports occasions, game updates, and community belief.



How Players Acquire Skins

- **Random Drops:** Players get random weapon drops or cases simply by playing on official or neighborhood servers.
- **Opening Cases:** Players can buy or make secrets to open weapon cases. However, the odds of unboxing unusual products (like knives) are famously low (approx. 0.26%).
- **Steam Community Market:** The official, managed platform where players buy and sell items using Steam Wallet funds.

- **M4A4|Howl:** The only weapon skin categorized with the "Contraband" rarity. It was eliminated from main drops years ago due to copyright concerns regarding its art work, making existing copies exceedingly unusual.
- **The Asimov Series:** Instantly identifiable by its futuristic, sci-fi orange-and-white aesthetic, spanning the AWP, M4A4, and P250.

Tips for Building Your Inventory

Whether you are wanting to invest or merely want a cool-looking loadout, keeping a couple of best practices in mind can save you cash and safeguard your digital properties.

- **Diversify Your Purchases:** If you are buying skins as an investment, search for items with steady need (like popular representative skins, cases, or stable weapon surfaces) instead of volatile high-tier items.
- **Focus on Security:** The CS: GO trading community is a regular target for phishers and scammers. Never ever click suspicious links, constantly use Steam Guard Mobile Authenticator, and be cautious when trading on third-party sites.
