- **Live roulette:** Similar to conventional casino roulette, however typically adjusted with 3 colors (e.g., Red, Black, and Green), where Green offers a massive payment due to lower chances.
- **Coinflip:** A classic 1v1 video game where 2 gamers wager equivalent skin values, and a digital coin flip determines the sole winner.

- **Jackpot:** Multiple players dispose skins into a typical pot. A virtual wheel spins, and the person who contributed the most has the greatest analytical opportunity of winning the whole swimming pool, though luck can prefer low-tier contributors.

Comparison of Common CS: GO Gambling Game Types
