- Proper infection control
- Effective clinical governance
- Patient safety and wellbeing
- Accurate record-keeping

The CQC's inspection framework is not cannabis-specific but covers overall healthcare quality and safety. This means the clinic must demonstrate safe prescribing processes, risk assessment, and patient consent procedures—critical aspects when dealing with **unlicensed medicines** like medical cannabis.



What Are Unlicensed Medicines and Risk Disclosure?

Medical cannabis products available on prescription in the UK are mostly **unlicensed medicines**. Unlike licensed medicines with UK marketing authorisations, unlicensed medicines do not have the same level of formal evaluation for all approved uses. Prescribing such products involves specific legal responsibilities.

Prescribers Must Inform Patients About Risks

Clinics must disclose that medical cannabis is unlicensed and explain the potential benefits and risks. This transparency is vital to help patients make informed decisions. The Care Quality Commission checks that this information is given clearly, typically through written leaflets and during consultations.

- Potential side effects
- Uncertain long-term safety
- Variability in product composition

- Unknown efficacy for specific conditions

Who Is Legally Allowed to Prescribe Medical Cannabis?

In England, only medical doctors registered with the **General Medical Council (GMC)** can prescribe medical cannabis. This is part of the UK-wide framework regulating controlled substances. Importantly, to prescribe these specialist products, doctors usually require a mix of appropriate training and expertise.

Specialist Competence and the GMC Specialist Register

1. The prescribing doctor's full name
2. Their GMC registration number
3. Whether they appear on the specialist register for the relevant condition

Scope of Prescribing and Governance in Medical Cannabis Clinics

Medical cannabis clinics operating under CQC regulations must respect professional prescribing boundaries. This means:

- Prescriptions should align with clinical evidence or guidelines
- Doctors should avoid offering cannabis as a “cure-all”

4. **Request detailed information on risks and benefits:** Ensure you receive clear, written information.
5. **Clarify pricing and fees upfront:** Avoid hidden costs by asking for a full price breakdown of consultation, medicine, and dispensing fees.

Final Thoughts

The short answer to "Is a medical cannabis clinic regulated by the CQC in England?" is yes — but with some nuance. The **clinic must have CQC registration** if it operates as an independent healthcare provider. The **prescribing doctor must be GMC-registered** and ideally have relevant specialist expertise. Due to the nature of cannabis as an *unlicensed medicine*, full risk disclosure and careful governance is essential.

My biggest advice? Always ask for the clinic's CQC registration number first, then confirm the doctor's GMC registration and specialist credentials. Steer clear of vague claims about "specialist doctors" who won't be named and packaged subscription deals that hide key fees. Independent healthcare in England is well-regulated, but only if you do your homework.
