Valve classifies skins into distinct rarity tiers, which determine how regularly they drop or are unboxed from cases. Understanding these tiers is vital for understanding a skin's standard worth.

Beyond these basic tiers, weapon finishes also feature **StatTrak™** [cs2skin](#) technology (which tracks the variety of kills made with that particular weapon, marked by a digital counter on the weapon) and **Souvenir** variants (dropped during main esports tournaments).

### Wear Conditions and Float Values

A major aspect in a skin's look and price is its **Wear Condition**, typically described as the float worth. The float value is a decimal number varying from **0.00 to 1.00** that determines how scratched, used, or faded a texture appears.



The 5 official wear conditions are:

1. **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07-- Looks beautiful, though some skins can still have minor scratches even at 0.00.
2. **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15-- Slight signs of wear, usually small scratches on the magazine or edges.
3. **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15-- 0.38-- Noticeable wear and tear, however the overall art work remains undamaged. This is the most common condition traded.
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45-- Significant wear, with large portions of the paint scraped away or faded.
5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00-- Heavily damaged. Some skins go through massive visual transformations at this phase, in some cases looking totally rusted or weathered.

*Keep in mind: Certain skins are "float-capped," implying they can not exist in particular conditions. For instance, a specific skin may be capped at a minimum float of 0.06, making Factory New the only high-tier condition readily available.*

## The Economics of CS: GO Skins

The market surrounding these virtual products is often studied by economists and financial experts. Because Valve permits peer-to-peer trading and third-party cash-out sites, skins work similarly to stocks or rare art. Numerous key chauffeurs determine skin rates:

- **Supply and Demand:** If a case is stopped and stops dropping, the supply of its skins freezes while need may continue to rise, driving up costs.
- **Pro Player Influence:** When a well-known esports expert utilizes a specific skin throughout a major competition, its popularity and price frequently rise overnight.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can sell ten skins of one rarity tier for one skin of the next higher tier from the exact same collection, impacting the flow of high-end products.
- **Sticker labels and Patches:** Applying unusual tournament sticker labels (such as Kato '14 holos) to a weapon can significantly increase its total worth, depending on the purchaser.

## Tips for Buying, Selling, and Trading

Venturing into the CS: GO skin market can be fulfilling, but it requires care. The community is regularly targeted by scammers and phishers. Anybody looking to build an inventory should keep these best practices in mind:

- **Secure Your Account:** Always allow Steam Guard Mobile Authenticator. Never ever log into third-party sites utilizing your Steam qualifications unless you have actually completely confirmed their authenticity.

- **Usage Reputable Marketplaces:** While the Steam Community Market is the best, funds are locked within the Steam environment. Numerous traders use relied on third-party markets that allow real-world money withdrawals, however always research charges and neighborhood reputation first.
- **Understand Market Trends:** Prices change based on game updates, major competitions, and seasonal sales. Avoid panic-selling throughout abrupt market dips.
- **Inspect the Float:** Always examine a skin in-game or by means of a specialized internet browser extension before purchasing to ensure the wear pattern matches your expectations.
