

Newton has a way of surprising people who think they already know greater Boston. On a map, it looks like a close-in suburb, but spend time here and the city reveals a more layered personality. It has village centers that still feel distinct from one another, a civic life shaped by school calendars and local traditions, and a built environment that carries the weight of New England history without freezing the place in the past. That balance is a big part of Newton's appeal.
