Skins normally fall into a couple of main categories:



- **Weapon Skins:** Alters assault rifles, bolt actions, semi-automatic handguns, and melee tools.
- **Clothes & & Armor Skins:** Covers everything from standard burlap and leather to heavy metal plate armor and hazmat suits.
- **Implementation Skins:** Changes the look of storage boxes, sleeping bags, furnaces, and doors.
- **Workshop Skins:** Community-created designs sent for neighborhood and developer approval.

The Rust Skin Economy: How It Works

Unlike numerous video games where cosmetic microtransactions are strictly bound to an in-game shop with set rates, *Rust* runs on a dynamic, player-driven economy.

Skins get in the video game mainly through the **Steam Community Market** and the official weekly **Rust Item Store**. Facepunch launches a curated batch of new skins every Thursday. Once these main shop sales end, those items become tradeable and valuable strictly through peer-to-peer transactions on Steam.

Market forces dictate the prices of these digital products. Factors affecting a skin's value include:

- **Supply and Demand:** How lots of units were sold throughout their preliminary run versus how lots of active gamers want them.
- **Visual Appeal and Utility:** Highly detailed items or those featuring unique camouflage often command greater costs.
