Pros:

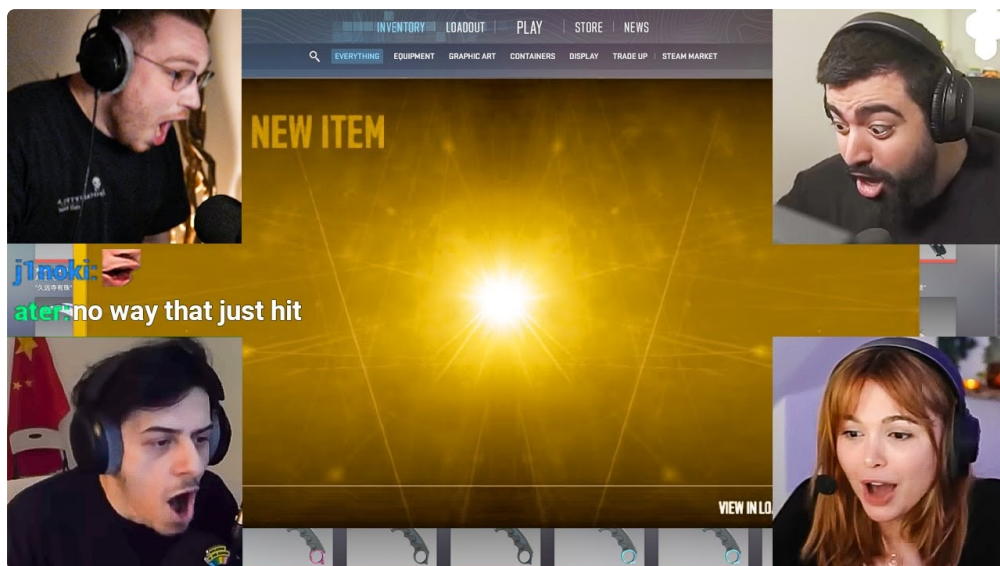
- **More Engaging than Solo Openings:** The PvP aspect adds enjoyment and adrenaline.
