Ants

Cockroaches

Bed bugs

Mice

With mice, the biggest obstacle often comes from the structure itself. Small gaps around utility penetrations, garage doors, vents, and foundation cracks can keep letting new animals in. In winter, pest activity can shift indoors. Southern Ontario's seasonal changes affect when pests are out and about and where they hide. As temperatures fall, mice and some insects move inside for protection. As it warms up, other pests become more active in walls, attics, decks, and yards. This seasonal movement can affect how fast treatment results appear, especially if pest movement is coming from outside the structure.

Hamilton also has a broad mix of building types. Older neighbourhood homes often have older foundations, original trim, and hidden gaps that create entry points. Newer suburbs may have tighter construction, but even modern homes can have utility openings, garage gaps, and landscaping issues that let pests in.
