- **The 7-Day Trade Hold:** Introduced in 2018, this guideline prevents traded items from being traded again for 7 days. This significantly interrupted automated bot betting networks that depend on immediate turnover.

- **Cease-and-Desist Letters:** Valve has actually occasionally provided legal cautions to major betting operators, requiring lots of prominent sites to close down or change their service models.
