As illustrated above, your home or the RNG (Random Number Generator) dictates when a crash takes place. A round can crash immediately at 1.00 x, ruining anyone who did not react in milliseconds.

### Why Do Players Risk Their Skins?

The skin economy operates in a different way than fiat currency. To numerous players, a digital knife worth £ 300 feels less tangible than a £ 300 costs in their physical wallet. This abstraction of worth lowers the psychological barrier to gaming. Moreover, skin crash sites provide numerous special functions:

- **Accessibility:** Anyone with a Steam account and a couple of low-tier weapon surfaces can take part.
- **Speed:** Rounds last anywhere from a couple of seconds to less than a minute, offering immediate satisfaction.
