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Columbus has a generous canopy for a Midwestern city. Maples shade Clintonville driveways, pin oaks line Upper Arlington streets, and cottonwoods extend along the Scioto. That canopy features duty. Storm-damaged branches, emerald ash borer losses, and aging silver maples near service lines produce hard calls for homeowners. Employ the wrong crew and you run the risk of residential or commercial property damage, surprise charges, or a tree that grows back into a danger. The best results start before you ever get the phone. In my years dealing with homeowner and walking job websites with arborists throughout Franklin County, I've seen patterns. Good results originate from a couple of essential choices made early and made with a clear head. Start by Asking: Remove, Lower, or Retain?

Clarify the Scope: Removal, Trimming, and Stump Grinding
