

In busy clinical environments, CCTV systems play an important role in ensuring safety, security, and smooth operations. However, as clinics collect more video footage, privacy risks become a real concern — especially when cameras inadvertently capture sensitive personal information like staff name badges.

This blog post will guide clinic managers and operations teams on how to address the problem of cameras capturing clear images of name badges, with a focus on data minimization, purpose-first camera justification, and practical techniques like manual blur badges, reposition camera, and limit export. Why Is Capturing Name Badges a Problem?

Name badges on staff uniforms typically include their full name and job title. When CCTV cameras capture these details clearly, several risks arise:

- **Privacy violations:** Name and role details are personal data protected under data privacy laws (like HIPAA in the U.S. or GDPR in Europe).
- **Unauthorized access:** Badges can help outsiders piece together staff identities and roles, potentially increasing security risks.
- **Over-collection of data:** Collecting detailed personal information through CCTV exceeds the principle of data minimization and can lead to legal consequences.

Instead of simply accepting this as unavoidable, clinics should actively reduce unnecessary collection by designing camera setups and workflows with privacy-first principles.

Step 1: What Incident Are We Trying to Solve?

Before taking any action or adding technology, ask the key question: *What incident or risk are we trying to solve with this camera?*

Understanding the core purpose of each camera directs the setup and privacy controls. For example:

- Is the camera meant primarily to monitor patient waiting areas for safety?
- Is it for preventing theft at the cash drawer?
- Is it designed to check if staff wash their hands properly in clinical rooms?

Clarifying the **purpose** ensures you avoid over-collection by narrowing camera field-of-views strictly to what's needed.

Step 2: Review Camera Placement and Field-of-View

Common mistakes that lead to name badges being clearly visible include:

- **Cameras aimed too close to staff workstations or reception desks.**
- **Wide-angle views capturing hallways and doorways where badges are within close-up range.**
- **Overhead and angled views that catch badges on uniforms in near-detail.**

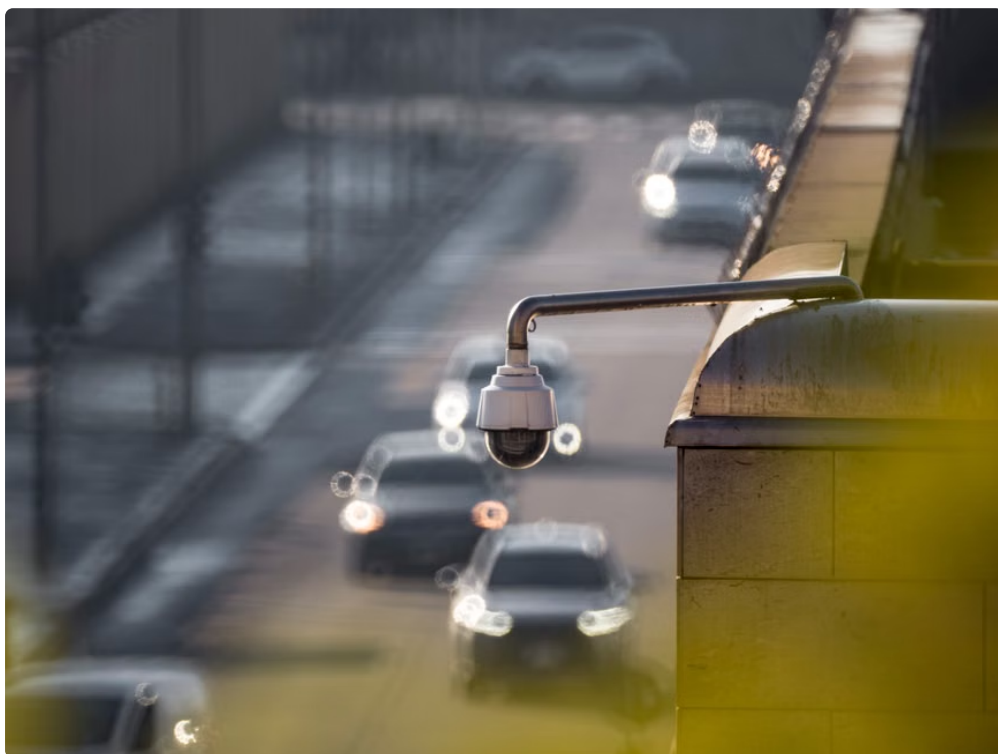
How to fix this:

1. **Reposition camera:** Adjust to reduce zoom or angle so badges are blurry or out of frame.
2. **Limit field-of-view:** Use cameras with adjustable fields-of-view or add physical blockers/mount shields where possible.
3. **Conduct regular reviews:** Clinic leaders or privacy officers should schedule walkthroughs to confirm cameras don't capture badges prominently.

Document these field-of-view reviews regularly. Keeping a log with photos before and after adjustments helps maintain compliance and accountability.

Step 3: Implement Data Minimization and Purpose-First Justification

Data minimization means only collecting footage that directly supports the camera's justified purpose. For example, if a camera's aim is *monitoring cash drawer transactions*, footage showing clearly named badges provides no additional safety benefit and should be avoided.



When mounting or configuring cameras:

- Only cover necessary areas related to the identified risk.
- Use cameras with better resolution controls to avoid over-collecting extra details.
- Avoid defaults that capture everything “just in case”.

This aligns with legal frameworks requiring that personal data collection is limited and proportionate.

Step 4: Use Manual Blur Badges and Visual Redaction Software

What if repositioning the camera isn’t an option, or you need to keep the current angle for safety reasons? In these cases, **manual blurring** or redaction of name badges in stored footage becomes essential.

Step 5: Limit Export and Control Access

Preventing privacy leaks means controlling who can access or export footage. Standard practice problems include shared passwords to CCTV *blur faces in security video* systems or generic user accounts — major security and audit risks.

Best practice: Implement **role-based CCTV user accounts** with named users. Features should include:

- User-specific login credentials (no shared passwords).
- Granular permissions restricting what footage each user can view or export.
- Audit trails logging all access and exports for accountability.
