Step-by-Step Troubleshooting Guide

If you are experiencing recurring crashes, work through the following troubleshooting steps systematically.

1. Confirm the Integrity of Game Files

In time, game files can end up being damaged due to unanticipated system shutdowns, incomplete updates, or malfunctioning storage drives. Steam has an integrated tool to inspect and change missing [The original source](#) or broken files.

- Open the **Steam Library**.
- Right-click on **CS: GO** and select **Properties**.
- Browse to the **Local Files** tab.
- Click **Verify Integrity of Game Files**.
- Await the process to surface (Steam will immediately download any corrupted files), then restart your computer system.

2. Update or Roll Back Graphics Drivers

- **NVIDIA Users:** Open GeForce Experience or check out the main NVIDIA website to download the most recent Game Ready Driver.

3. Adjust Launch Options

- Go to your Steam Library, right-click **CS: GO**, and choose **Properties**.
- Under the **General** tab, search for **Launch Options**.

 - -high (Sets CS: GO to high CPU priority)
 - -autoconfig (Resets video and efficiency settings to default if the game declines to launch)

4. Run the Game as Administrator

- Click Apply and OK.

5. Look For Background Application Interference

- Discord Overlay
- NVIDIA GeForce Experience Overlay
- RivaTuner Statistics Server (RTSS) and MSI Afterburner
- Third-party anti-viruses software application (attempt adding an exemption for the Steam folder)

Advanced Troubleshooting

If fundamental repairs fail to deal with the issue, the issue might lie much deeper within your os or hardware configuration.

1. Managing Overclocks and XMP Profiles

While overclocking your CPU, GPU, or RAM provides a performance increase, CS: GO is infamously conscious hardware instability.

- If you have applied an aggressive overclock, try calling it back to baseline factory specifications.
- If you are running high-speed RAM, test disabling your motherboard's **XMP (Extreme Memory Profile)** or **DOCP** in the BIOS to see if memory instability is causing the crashes.

2. Re-installing CS: GO Cleanly

Sometimes, remaining custom maps, outdated workshop products, or greatly customized setup files cause relentless disputes.

- Uninstall CS: GO through Steam.
- By hand navigate to the installation directory site (... steamapps \ common \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive) and delete any staying folders.
- Re-install a fresh copy of the video game.
