The most typical condition. **Well-Worn (WW)** 0.38-- 0.45 Considerable wear, heavy scratching, and noticeable paint breaking. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.45-- 1.00 Very used, rusted, or faded. In some cases valued for special "blackimov" results.

Keep in mind: Some skins are "capped," meaning they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower float versions incredibly rare and expensive.
