If you mop too wet, especially in a coastal home, the floor can warp, haze, or lose its finish far sooner than it should.

The best maintenance habits are often boring, which is usually a good sign. Use mats at entries. Keep pet nails trimmed. Sweep frequently with a soft-bristle broom or vacuum made for hard surfaces. There is also a middle ground that many owners overlook. Sometimes a floor needs targeted hardwood floor services, not a full refinishing job. That may include spot repair, buffing, recoating, or assessment of isolated problem areas. In a coastal neighborhood, this kind of judgment saves a great deal of expense. Replacing or refinishing more than necessary is a common mistake, especially in properties managed from afar.

A good rule of thumb is to look at the floor in natural light. If it still has an intact finish but looks dingy, the issue is usually cleaning.
