Comprehending Wear and Tear (Exterior Conditions)

The condition of a skin drastically affects its appearance and market price. The wear is divided into 5 unique exterior categories based upon the float value:

Exterior Condition	Float Value Range	Visual Description
Factory New (FN)	0.00-- 0.07	Beautiful condition with very little to no scratches or paint cracking. Typically the most pricey.
Very Little Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Very slight blemishes or scratches, typically visible just upon close assessment.
Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Obvious

wear, scratches, and fading. This is the most typical condition in the game. **Well-Worn (WW)** 0.38-- 0.45
Significant wear; large portions of the paint may be scraped off or heavily faded. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.45-- 1.00
Severe wear. The weapon typically looks rusted, heavily damaged, or practically entirely stripped of paint. *(Note: Some particular skins in fact look better or "cooler" in Battle-Scarred due to unique wear patterns).*

Rarity Tiers and Grades

Valve categorizes skins into different tiers of rarity, which determine how often they drop in-game or how difficult they are to pull from weapon cases. The standard weapon grades, from most typical to rarest, include:

1. **Consumer Grade** (White) - Basic, standard-issue weapons.
2. **Industrial Grade** (Light Blue) - Slightly better than customer grade, still fairly typical.
3. **Mil-Spec Grade** (Dark Blue) - The standard for a lot of standard collection drops and lower-tier case items.
4. **Restricted** (Purple) - Uncommon drops, often featuring more intricate styles.
5. **Classified** (Pink) - Rare items that start featuring complex art work and greater market price.
6. **Covert** (Red) - The highest standard weapon tier. These are extremely unusual and highly sought after.
7. **Special/ Exceedingly Rare** (Gold) - Knives and wearable gloves. These inhabit the peak of CS: GO skin collecting.

How Are Skins Acquired?

- **Trade-Up Contracts:** A mechanic where a player can trade ten skins of the exact same quality tier for one random skin of the next higher quality tier.
