4. Prize/ Pot Games

- **How it works:** Multiple players deposit skins into a collective pot. Each skin contributes tickets based upon its dollar value. A random draw chooses a winner, where a greater total contribution yields a higher statistical opportunity of winning the entire pot.
- **Appeal:** The ultimate "high-roller" video game mode, where single fortunate winners can leave with thousands of dollars in rare digital items.
