How Transactions Work: Skins vs. Crypto

- **Steam API/ P2P Trading:**

- **Absence of Consumer Protection:** Because these sites are largely uncontrolled, if a site closes down or declines to honor a withdrawal, users have essentially no legal recourse.
- **Steam Account Security:** Logging into third-party sites via the Steam OpenID protocol requires caution. Phishing sites regularly mimic popular gambling platforms to steal API keys and pirate user stocks.
 - *Suggestion:* Never enter your Steam credentials on a website you have not thoroughly vetted, and always use Steam Guard Mobile Authenticator.
