In this way, **bingo sound effects** maintain a sense of identity, honoring the game's roots while embracing modern convenience.

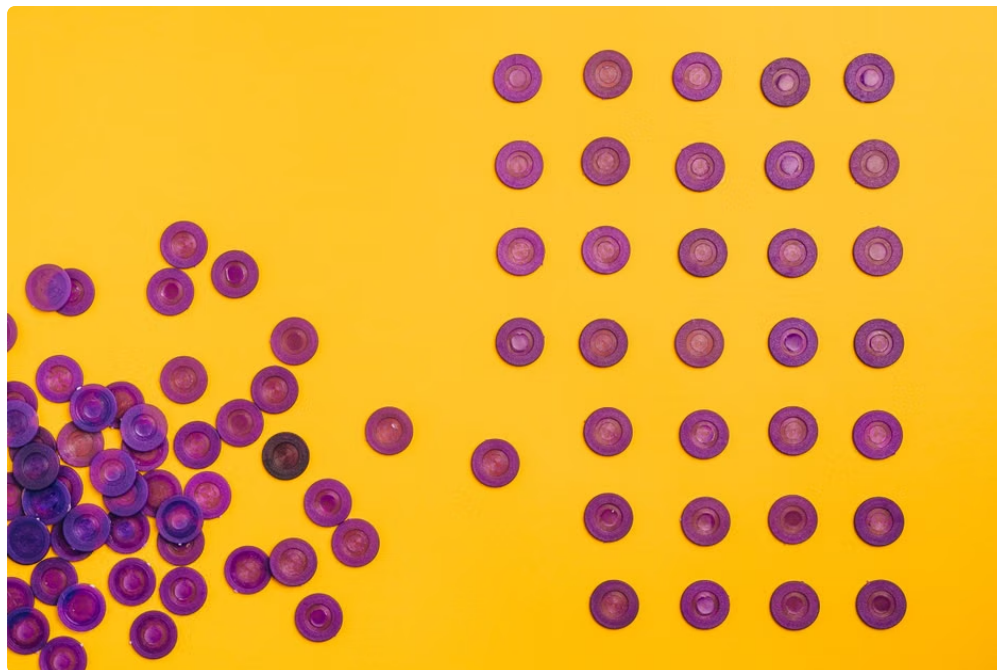
Auto-Marking and Reduced Manual Checking
