Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Very used, in some cases modifying the graphic totally. <i>(Note: Some skins look uniquely cool in BS, referred to as "Blackscars").</i>

StatTrak™ and Souvenirs

- **StatTrak™:** Items with this technology feature an orange LED counter that tracks the number of confirmed eliminates made with that particular weapon.
- **Memento Packages:** These are dropped throughout official Valve-sponsored esports tournaments (Majors) and function gold stickers representing the groups and MVP of the round.

The Rarity Tiers

Valve organizes CS2 skins into standardized rarity tiers, which dictate how regularly they drop in-game or emerge from weapon cases.

1. **Customer Grade (White):** Common, fundamental drops.
2. **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly much better than Consumer, typical in containers.
