Intrastate Moving Rules Virginia vs Interstate Moving Regulations

Common non-allowable items include:

- Flammable liquids and gases (e.g., gasoline, propane tanks, paint thinners)
- Explosives or fireworks
- Perishable foods or plants
- Live animals
- Illegal substances or stolen property
- Items requiring special licensing or permits

Because discovering non-allowables on move day can cause delays or refused service (and yes, telling your movers about paints or aerosols at 8:00 a.m. is a common annoyance!), it's best to disclose these items early. - **Measure doorways, stairs, and hallways:** Avoid last-minute hassles by measuring your bulky furniture against all exit points and entry paths.
