1. Repairing a Squeaky or Loose Hinge

A squeaky door is a simple fix, but a loose hinge requires a bit more attention.

1. **Find the problem:** Open and close the door slowly to pinpoint the troublesome hinge.
2. **Tighten screws:** Use a screwdriver to tighten any loose screws. If the screw holes have actually become stripped, remove the screws, place a small wood sliver (or a toothpick coated in wood glue) into the hole, and reinsert the screw for a tight grip.
3. **Oil:** If the door squeaks, apply a couple of drops of light-weight device oil, silicone spray, or petroleum jelly to the hinge pin. Wipe away any excess.

2. Adjusting a Sticking Door

If a door rubs against the frame when closing, it is usually due to the fact that the leading hinge is loose, triggering the door to sag, or the wood has actually expanded.

1. **Inspect the hinges:** Tighten all screws on the top and middle hinges.
2. **Use the longer screw technique:** If tightening up doesn't work, change one brief screw on the frame side of the leading hinge with a 3-inch wood screw. Drive it deep into the framing stud to pull the entire door assembly back into positioning.

3. **Airplane the edge:** If the door still sticks after adjusting the hinges, utilize a block plane or a sander to shave down a tiny fraction of wood from the sticking edge, then repaint or seal the exposed wood.
