A random ticket is drawn, and the winner takes the whole pot. High (Depends on the portion of the pot owned) **Case Opening** Mimics the official Valve case openings, frequently with higher or personalized chances and special prize swimming pools. High (Typically unfavorable go back to player ratios) **Esports Betting** Wagering skins or cash on expert CS: GO/CS2 matches (e.g., ESL Pro League, Majors) based on live chances. Skill/Knowledge-dependent (Moderate threat)
