6. **Hot Key or Cylinder:** The metal key or the ignition location feels uncommonly hot to the touch after driving, showing an electrical brief.

What You *Should* Do:

1. **Put the automobile in Park (or Neutral for manuals)** and engage the emergency brake.
2. **Call a mobile vehicle locksmith** immediately.
3. **Keep the damaged pieces** of the key. The locksmith can use these pieces to cut a brand-new key on the area using specialized equipment.
