- **Coinflip:** A basic 1v1 game where two players wager equal skin values on a virtual coin turn. Winner takes all (minus a small site commission, known as the "rake").
- **Jackpot:** Multiple gamers pool their skins into a single pot. A wheel spins to choose a winner, with a gamer's chance of winning proportional to the total financial worth of the skins they transferred.
