

Introduction

Techniques for Success

While the core mechanic is random, players can embrace practices that help handle threat and extend gameplay:

- **Bankroll Management**
 - Set a fixed budget plan per session (e.g., 5% of total bankroll).
 - Stop after losing that quantity; prevent "chasing after" losses.
- **Select Cases with Favorable Drop Rates**
 - Some cases have a greater percentage of "blue" (common) skins but sometimes yield high-value "red" (rare) items.
 - Research the case's drop table before entering a battle.
- **Take advantage of "Insurance" Features**
 - Certain platforms let you acquire insurance that refunds a portion of the deposit if you lose.
- **Play During Off-Peak Hours**
 - Less active gamers can mean larger prize pools per battle, as the pot is not watered down amongst lots of individuals.

- **High house edge:** Even the finest platforms retain 4-10% of the pot.
