The Anatomy of a Finish: What Determines Value?

1. Exterior Wear (Float Value)

Every product drops with a specific "float worth" varying from **0.00 to 1.00**, which identifies its physical wear and tear. The float is divided into five official wear categories:

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07 (Pristine, minimal scratches)
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15 (Slight blemishes, generally near edges)
- **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15-- 0.38 (Noticeable wear, scratches, or fading)
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45 (Significant wear, paint cracking)
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Extremely used, sometimes considerably modifying the texture)

Note: Some products look great even in Battle-Scarred condition, while others are treasured strictly in Factory New.

2. Product Rarity Tiers

Valve classifies weapon surfaces into color-coded tiers based upon their drop rates in cases or trade-ups.

Rarity Tier Color Code Drop Rate/ Acquisition Method **Consumer Grade** White Discovered in weekly drops/ Base game **Industrial Grade** Light Blue Typical drops/ Low-tier case contents **Mil-Spec** Dark Blue Requirement case drops **Limited** Purple Unusual case drops **Categorized** Pink Unusual case drops **Covert** Red Very rare case drops (Top-tier standard weapons) **Exotic/ Special** Gold Exceptionally uncommon (Knives and Gloves)

Patterns and StatTrak™: The Elements of Prestige

Beyond float values and rarities, 2 significant features can significantly inflate an item's worth: **Pattern Indexes** and **StatTrak™ technology**.



Pattern Templates

Lots of finishes use a procedural generation system where a texture design template moves throughout the weapon model based on a "Paint Seed" (from 1 to 1000). Depending upon the seed number, the visual look can alter totally.

- **Case Hardened:** Famous for its blue and gold circulations. A pattern with a high portion of solid blue on top can command tens of countless dollars.
- **Fade:** Depending on the seed, the shift from yellow to pink to purple can vary, with "100% Fade" variants bring leading dollar.

StatTrak™ Technology

Items geared up with StatTrak™ feature a little digital LCD screen attached to the weapon body that tracks the variety of validated kills the owner makes with it. While these products drop at the same rate as their non-StatTrak equivalents, they normally command a higher price on the Steam Community Market and third-party trading sites.

How to Acquire Them

Constructing a digital inventory can be approached through numerous various approaches, each carrying its own risks and benefits.

4. **Trade-Ups:** A system where gamers can trade ten products of one rarity tier for one random product of the next higher tier within the exact same collection.
