- **Trade Hold Implementations:** To slow down the quick transfer of skins in between accounts, Valve presented a seven-day trade hang on products traded from user stocks. This seriously interfered with the instant-deposit and instant-withdrawal models that gambling sites trusted.
- **Cease-and-Desist Letters:** Valve has lawfully forced prominent platform operators to close down their operations or pivot away from utilizing Steam-related infrastructure.

Regardless of these procedures, operators continue to adapt by utilizing peer-to-peer markets, alternative cryptocurrencies, and offshore licensing to keep their platforms running.
