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A healthy tree is a long-lasting partner to a home, a rising asset that throws shade, holds soil, and frames the sky. A hazardous tree is the opposite. It leans over a roofline, sheds heavy limbs in storms, or shows decay you can probe with a screwdriver. Commercial auto insurance coverage matters when a chip truck or crane is involved.
