A 1932 letter to *The Times* in London in-depth confusion over the rules of "zhot" (an Asian hand video game), while a post in the *New York Tribune* in 1924 introduced the video game to American readers as a method used by Chinese citizens. By the mid-1900s, it had actually sealed itself in global pop culture.
