- **Wear Condition (Float Value):** Skins are categorized into five wear tiers based upon a mathematical float worth varying from 0.00 to 1.00:
 - Factory New (FN)

- Minimal Wear (MW)
 - Field-Tested (FT)
 - Well-Worn (WW)
 - Battle-Scarred (BS)
- **StatTrak™ Technology:** Roughly 10% of opened items feature a StatTrak™ module, which physically engraves the variety of confirmed kills made with that weapon onto the surface. StatTrak items typically command a greater cost.
 - **Pattern Templates:** Certain skins (like the famous *Case Hardened* AK-47) function randomized textures based upon a pattern index (1 to 1000). Specific rare patterns-- such as a 100% blue top-- can increase a weapon's value exponentially.

Kinds of Cases: Prime, Rare, and Commemorative

Over a years of updates, Valve has actually launched dozens of cases. They usually fall under 3 unique categories:

1. **Active Drop Pool Cases:** These are currently dropping to players actively playing the video game on official servers. They are the most plentiful and most affordable cases on the marketplace.
