

Rome, Georgia has always had a way of making geography feel like destiny. Sit at the meeting point of the Etowah and Oostanaula rivers, and you start to understand why this city took root where it did. The land shaped the settlement, the rivers shaped the economy, and the hills shaped the neighborhoods that followed.
